Alaska's Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS) has proposed 5% decrease to the reimbursement rate for Personal Care Services (PCS) and Home and Community-Based Waiver Services (HCBS) that will directly impact the access and availability to quality supports for Alaska's seniors and individuals who experience disability throughout our State. This 5% reduction is coupled with withholding of Provider inflationary rate adjustments which have impacted these services for three out of the last four fiscal years and increasing administrative burdens...

Please tell your legislators to request that DHSS exclude HCBS and PCS programs from Medicaid reimbursement cuts, because these services are vital to Alaskans. What can you do:

[P]lease contact your legislator [ASAP] to make them aware that:

- They may not have all the information about the Medicaid cuts
- PersonalCareSvcs and Home&CommunityBasedSvcs are not exempt
- There are no protections in place to ensure access to PCS and HCBS for Alaska's seniors and those who experience disability
- The industry has not been asked what the potential impact of these rate reductions might be to access or quality of services
- Access to PCS and HCBS will be detrimentally impacted by these actions

The Governor's budget recommends approximately \$761 Million in cuts to Medicaid services. This means nearly half of the Governor's proposed \$1.6 Billion reduction in state spending is targeted at Medicaid. Cuts of this magnitude to the state's Medicaid system will harm thousands of Alaskans who rely on Medicaid long term care to help them stay healthy in their homes."

Denali Elementary Proximity to Cell Phone Towers - These studies recommend 300, 400, even 500 meter "exclusion zones" surrounding cell phone towers. Fairbanks has many houses and at least two schools (Denali and U Park) that didn't take these peer-reviewed journals into account before granting cell phone tower permits:

- **International Journal of Occupational and Environmental Health**: Increased prevalence of adverse neurobehavioral symptoms or cancer in populations living closer than **500 meters** from cell phone towers, despite exposure levels within international safety guidelines
- **Science of the Total Environment**: Mortality rate from neoplasia was 34.76 per 10,000 inhabitants within **500 meters** of cell phone towers in Belo Horizonte, Brazil. Outside of these areas, neoplasia deaths were significantly reduced. The largest density power was 40.78 $\mu\text{W}/\text{cm}^2$, and the smallest was 0.04 $\mu\text{W}/\text{cm}^2$.
- **Environmental Medicine Society (German)**: Proportion of newly developing cancer cases was significantly higher among those patients who had lived during the past ten years at a distance of up to 400 meters from the cellular transmitter site.
- **Pathology Biology (France)**: Among residents near cell phone towers, women report significantly more headache, nausea, loss of appetite, sleep disturbance, depression, discomfort and visual perturbations than men. Human occupancy should exceed **300 meters** from cell phone base stations.
- **Electromagnetic Biology and Medicine**: Residents living within **80 meters** of cell phone towers have significantly more DNA damage and antioxidants in peripheral blood lymphocytes, compared to residents **300 meters** from cell phone towers.

Electromagnetic Biology and Medicine: The most critical regions of a child's head absorb two to ten times more RadioFrequency ElectroMagneticField than adults. Current exposure limits assume the anatomy of U.S. military recruits. Accountable, independent groups should revise U.S. exposure limits, using anatomically-based models. *More studies on these topics are listed at <http://www.5gfrequencyfreefairbanks.org/>*

““Since 1979, do you know how many times China has been at war with anybody?” [former U.S. President Jimmy] Carter asked. “None. And we have stayed at war.” The U.S., he noted, has only enjoyed 16 years of peace in its 242-year history, making the country “the most warlike nation in the history of the world,” Carter said. This is, he said, because of America’s tendency to force other nations to “adopt our American principles.”

In China, meanwhile, **the economic benefits of peace** were clear to the eye. “How many miles of high-speed railroad do we have in this country?” he asked. While China has some 18,000 miles of high-speed rail, the U.S. has “wasted, I think, \$3 trillion” on military spending. “It’s more than you can imagine. China has not wasted a single penny on war, and that’s why they’re ahead of us. In almost every way.”

“And I think the difference is if you take \$3 trillion and put it in American infrastructure you’d probably have \$2 trillion leftover. We’d have high-speed railroad. We’d have bridges that aren’t collapsing, we’d have roads that are maintained properly.
