Supreme Court Rejects Cell Phone Industry Challenge To Berkeley Ordinance

“The court agreed that our precious First Amendment guarantees that we have the right to know that cell phones emit radiation and that levels can be exceeded when phones contact the body. Astonishingly, the industry argued that compelling them to provide information about tested distances set for large adults denied their right to keep this information hidden as part of their right to free speech.

“Investigations at FCC accredited labs by the [Chicago Tribune](#), the law firm of [Fegan Scott](#), and [CBC Broadcasting](#), as well as tests of hundreds of phones by the French government disclosed that the Berkeley advice may well underestimate exposures. Veterans For Peace “Resolution 2019-7 Stop Military Encroachment On The Environment (passed):

Whereas, The Department of Defense is engaged in dramatic expansion of bases and warfare trainings around the country by expanding military training on public lands, avoiding the impacts of military expansion by segmenting projects, and by using the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process to instruct the military in how to get what it wants, including initiating land-use legislation in state legislatures, and

Whereas, to further its national expansion plans, The US Army War College created a guide for enabling more military operations on public lands. The “Military Training on Public Lands: Guidelines for Success” is still the Bible of military land grabs for the public lands and contains a whole section on NEPA, and

Whereas, base and training expansion proposals are taking place across the country at bases like Eglin in Florida and Lemoore in Nevada, and in communities like Burlington, Vermont, Whidbey Island, Washington, and in Colorado, New Mexico, and Arizona, and etc., and

Whereas, it is essential for the public to engage in a public policy discussion about the massive military expansion underway in the United States, Veterans for Peace can provide leadership and support for strengthening NEPA policies and for state efforts like Washington’s Attorney General in making the military follow the law;

Therefore Be It Resolved that Veterans For Peace will support state efforts, like Washington’s Attorney General Robert Ferguson, to take action to protect citizens, our environment, and make the military follow the law, which includes strengthening the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) to stop military encroachment on public lands, air, and seas, and its adverse impacts on our communities.

After careful deliberation, Anchorage Superior Court Judge Jennifer Henderson has ruled in the name of justice, in support of the separation of powers, and determined that the ACLU of Alaska’s lawsuit against Governor Michael J. Dunleavy should proceed.“

from *Rep Don Young*: “National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2020... included numerous provisions that I support; ... language ... allowing for the **creation of a Strategic Arctic Port**. Additionally, **many communities are in need of infrastructure investments to support military installations**, and this is why the

Conference Report authorizes \$75 million for the Office of Economic Adjustment's Defense Community Infrastructure Program. This program provides grants and supplemental funds to assist state and local governments in addressing deficiencies in community infrastructure projects or outside facilities that support military installations.

During the NDAA process, there have also been some loud and boisterous calls for how to deal with poly- and perfluorinated alkyl substances (PFAS) contamination. Both the House and the Senate had different provisions on how to solve this issue. The Conference Report prohibits the use of firefighting foam containing PFAS after October 1, 2024, and immediately prohibits the uncontrolled release of fluorinated aqueous film-forming foam (AFFF) and the use of AFFF in training exercises at military installations. This agreement also encourages the Secretary of Defense to finalize cooperative agreements with states to address contamination by these substances and authorizes the National Guard to access Defense Environmental Remediation Account funds for the purpose of addressing PFAS/PFOA exposure and contamination resulting from National Guard activities.”

In 2017, 122 countries in the United Nations general assembly voted to support the TPNW. To date, 79 countries have signed the TPNW, and 32 countries have ratified the treaty. In April 2020, signatures from the [Hibakusha Appeal](#) will be presented at Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) Review Conference at the United Nations Headquarters in New York City. On September 14th, Anchorage Mayor Ethan Berkowitz signed the [ICAN Cities Appeal](#), making Anchorage the first city in Alaska to officially endorse the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. Two months earlier, Skagway Mayor Andrew Cremata joined [Mayors for Peace](#), making Skagway the first member city from Alaska! “Hello this is The Asymmetric Moose, Rob Mulford, with picks of the week of December 29, 2019. I suppose it is customary to offer a recap of the past years events of notable import when one does their last show of the year. For todays program, however, I would like to focus on a systemic problem that has its roots sunk deep into our past. I’m talking about Police Brutality and Extra Judicial Killing. Some might say, Extra Judicial Killing? Moose, what are you talking about?

This past Tuesday evening Heather and I attended a Christmas Eve memorial and solidarity gathering for the family of Cody Eyre and other families in the Alaska Community directly affected by Police Brutality and The Use of Excessive Force. Heather had the honor of interviewing Cody's father, Kyle Eyre, at the event. Please listen closely to Mr. Eyre's testimony.

What kind of picture did that paint in your mind? Maybe, A group of militarily armed law enforcement officers summarily executing a troubled young man who is pleading to be left alone and crying out, "I will not harm you?" We, as a community, have a serious problem that deserves our most serious attention. The Eyre family's website keepwalkingwithcody.com has a few suggestions.

Goal #1. Create a civilian review board comprised of four individuals. One member from the House, one member from the Senate, one member appointed by the governor and one member elected by the people during the scheduled elections.

Goal #2 Mandatory Crisis Intervention Training using the Memphis Model and incorporate medical professionals into 911 calls involving suicide, mental illness and persons in crisis calls.

Goal #3 Independent investigations monitored by the civilian review board.

Goal #4 Enhanced vetting of all new recruits to law enforcement in the state of Alaska and a comprehensive review of existing law enforcement officers including history of sexual assault, police brutality and misconduct.

Personally, I believe that the idea of a civilian review board could be expanded somewhat to include more members of the community, especially those that are not tied up in the economic entanglements of electioneering, but these ideas can serve as a damn good starting point.
